

Heart Mission, Absisng, Gilbert Is., Facific Ocean, dated 18.1.45.
"Here from December 1941 until Hovember 1943 we were cut off from
the other part of the world. Until September 1942 the wireless
was still being worked by the Hew Healand operators but in that
month the Japanese arrived to fortify Tarawa and straight away

and a few other white nen and kept them in Betic until the middle
of October 1942 when they were all billed. The poor nen were

BRUTAL TREATMENT OF PR/W RY JAPANESE

Extract from enclosure from Sr. M. Helena, F.M.D.S.C., Sacred Meart Mission, Abaisng, Gilbert Is., Pacific Ocean, dated 18.1.45. "More from Ducember 1941 until November 1943 we were out off from the other part of the world. Until September 1942 the wireless was still being worked by the New Zealand operators but in that month the Japanese arrived to fortify Tarawa and straight away collected all the poor unfortunate wireless operators seldiers, and a few other white men and kept them in Betie until the middle of October 1942 when they were all killed. The poor men were brutally treated by the enemy being tied to occount trees on their arrival in Tarawa and left there under the burning sun and rain for two or three days. Then they were forced to work. It was probably a happy release for them as the Japanese are terrible to their P.O.W Here in Abaiang we have lost two young Fathers, Father Marquis (Swiss) and Father Durand (French). At the end of August 1942 the two Fathers with 7 of the school boys and some sailors left here on a large cames to go to the island of Marakei. Which should be reached in about 6 hours.
