After he was beaten until his face was unrecognizable he and the rest were ordered outside and ordered to assume a position normally taken to do a push-up exercise. They were kept in this position for 2 hours. Cpl. Gilbert Duran was another of the victims and Sgt. Maj. Montanason and a civilian named Nagasi were responsible.

Cpl. Howard Duane Wilkinson states that in Sept. 1944, 250 men were working on airplane revetments at Zeblin Air Field and asked the Japs for water. Thirty of them were beaten with pick handles by the guards when they became unable to work from lack of water and food. Ellen J. Rounds was one who was beaten. Two guards were "Three Whiskers" and "Love You". Cpl. Jim Bradey and Hank Farr were prisoners there.

Rev Patrick Vincent McFadden states from 17 August to 22 August they were transported by boat from Casayan, Mindanao to Davao, Mindanao. They were given sleeping space in the hold--no beds, no bunks, no bedding and no mattresses were furnished. Food which they had bought out of their own funds was commandeered by the Japs and served, consisting of rice and canned fish. Murphy and Tom Bradey are victims. A large percentage consisted of men over 60; a number of women and about ten children under 18. Gen. Morimoto is accused.

As a result his eyeballs were severely blistered and Haughton's wife, Madeline Haughton, treated him for this injury.

At Yokohama D-1 I witnessed the beating of O. B. Harris, by a group of guards in charge of a guard by the name of "Little Sergeant". I was told that Harris struck a civilian while working in the ship yards, after the civilian had struck him several times with a stick. A group of 12 or 13 guards in charge of the guard known as "Little Sergeant beat on Harris for about 6 hrs with their fists and clubs and the guard known as Little Sergeant broke an ordinary pick handle across Harris' back. Harris fell and was unconscious for about an hour. He was placed in the guard house for about two weeks.

The Japanese strung all four of these men up by their thumbs where they could barely stand on their toes for 24 hrs. They were allowed to have no water and they were beaten with poles. They were taken down and forced to dig their graves and were shot and buried in these graves. I personally know Col Mowrey witnessed these beatings and executions.
