Were taken from the place of confinement at Anshan and put on a truck with 4 or 5 guards. A Jap reserve officer gathered and addressed a crowd through a public address system. T/Sgt. Davidson did not know what he said but the Jap civilians became very excited and made motions signifying they would like to cut their heads off. This was in Anshan.

Issued four small torn and filthy blankets. Snow and rain poured through large cracks in walls. Was severely beaten for asking for more clothes.

The men made the rice themselves and in the morning they had Lugao, soupy rice, and at noon and evening meals they had steamed rice. Once in a while they could get casava, bananas, eggs, payayas, limes or pineapple. This was the only way they could keep on living. The men suffered most with edema and swelling of the legs caused by the lack of proteins.

The work was hand labor, using shovels and picks to straighten out the runway and to build revetments for planes and munitions.
