In June 42 he was taken to the Philippine General Hospital in Manila with a severe case of Cerebral malaria. After several months he recovered and he and 31 others were sent to Santo Tomas posing as civilians who were in reality members of the Armed Forces. About 3 days later arrived at Fort Santiago he was taken from his cell and beat constantly for 36 hrs. in an attempt to find out why he had posed as a civilian. Out of the 32 he remembers a few of their names: Pat Patton, Arthur Lescano, Johnny Burke, Pvt. Joe Rogers, Pvt. Donald North, and Cpl. Lee.

Amelia Barretto Campbell states in Manila he saw a Japanese officer walk up with his sword out of his saber and cut the head off one of the Filipinos. Six Filipinos were imprisoned in an individual box that looked like a combination of a pillory and a steam bath for 3 days, exposed to the hot sun without food or water.

Amelia Barretto Campbell states Francisco Barretto and his son, Leboldo, were interned in the local jail at Iba. For 2 weeks Francisco Barretto was tied in a standing position with his hands extending over his head. He was suspected of guerrilla activities and was beaten and punished constantly over a period of 4 or 5 months.

Mr. Raoul de Sercy and Lt. Arthur J. Campbell both reported that an American by the name of Chester Bennett was executed at Stanley prison, Hong Kong, 32 people were executed altogether but most were Chinese. Chester Bennett, a retired petty officer in the USN was one of a small group of Americans who elected to remain in Hong Kong in 1942.

The above reports that he was told by a young Chinese that during his stay at the Queen Mary Hospital in Hong Kong, Jap soldiers ran through the war uncovering the women, bayonetting some and raping others, bayonetted many men patients in the Queen Mary Hospital.

Arthur J. Campbell reports that Dr. Black, a prominent physician in Hong Kong, was bayoneted and died soon after trying to prevent the rape and murder of his nurses at Stanley Hospital. The five or six nurses were all buried with him. This happened towards the close of the war.

The above states that after the surrender of Hong Kong, from Dec26 to Dec28, 1941 Japs combed the Happy Valley District and violated every girl they could lay their hands on. Bodies of many young girls who resisted were thrown into the streets, mutilated by bayonet thrusts. Japs were from the Light and Heavy Field Art. Units. Chinese nurses of the hospitals were raped & several foreign nurses of the temporary hospital in the Race Club. Miss R. Lewis saw bleeding bayoneted body of a young Chinese girl hurled out of a window. (5-45)2

The above was former Treasury Rep. at Hong. Kong. Consul Gen. Southard was instructed by the Jap Consul Gen to have all officials prisoners removed to two houses on Mount Cameron Rd, from Jan. 9 to Mar 10, 1942. No light or water facilities were available, they were obliged to purchase their own food. On Mar 11, 1942 they were transferred to a former school building adjoining Stanley Prison. Salt, rice & flour were furnished but were required to purchase such other food stuffs.

Pvt. Billy Campbell states that at Camp 17, Fukuoka during the first part of 1944 an American prisoner named Hurd was questioned concerning some food concealed on his body. Hurd was planning to escape. Lt. Uri Socho Dona offered Hurd a piece of gum and then bayoneted Hurd through the back with his rifle bayonet. Hurd died immediately and his body was cremated.
