The heat was so intense and the air so foul that men went out of their heads or passed out. One night he was delirious and thought he was at home and tried to get into the bathroom to get a drink. Three buckets used for latrines. 30 men died or were killed by companions during this trip. Pvt. Garland was one of the victims. Maj. Ferris, Lt. Wendell, CMM Hull, C.A. Lehman, Ben Krupa, EMLc, and Don McCutchen, MMLc, were on this ship.
