My dear Steve:

Your letter of 26 November has been received. With respect to paragraph 2, we have had ATIS as the central agency for the control of linguists throughout the War. In March '46 a personnel board cut ATIS drastically which caused the dispersion of linguists; some became stable boys in the 1st Cavalry Division. Many competent young linguist officers were greedily grabbed by the growing SCAP sections of GHQ. I have been taking steps to secure the assignment of these officers, as well as competent enlisted men in the same situation, to language units engaged in operational intelligence.

Paragraph 3 of your letter which states that favorable War Department action can be expected on any request made by the Theater for an increased allotment of personnel for 31 language teams, was especially welcome. I have obtained an allotment for 6 months for the theater overhead for this personnel but will require spaces from the War Department to enable the teams to operate throughout the period of repatriation of Japanese personnel from Soviet held areas. I am now requesting concurrence of G-3 with the request to the War Department. In addition to the 31 language teams required for Japan there are 6 language teams and 1 Hqs detachment, organized as per 30-600 T, which were scheduled for inactivation in Korea. I managed to secure spaces for these teams up to 1 July 1947 but will need War Department spaces after that.

I am still working on securing a proper location of MISIS in Japan. G-4 has objected to Tokyo, because of effect on the inadequate dependent housing situation, but I have found a place about 40 miles away which may be suitable. I expect to clear up this action one way or the other within the next week or two.

I have recently secured the commissioning of 13 Nisei Sergeants as 2nd Lieutenants. At one time it appeared that it might be practical to commission a larger number here, but many who were interested were not suitable. It might be practical for the War Department to secure language officers by offering commissions to outstanding linguists who were discharged as high ranking enlisted men. A request will be forwarded by the War Department to secure authority to promote reenlisting linguists to T/4's after reenlistment.

The personnel situation in G-2 is acute. I need urgently at least 2 Colonels, 4 Lt. Colonels, 2 Majors, 13 Captains and 9 1st Lieutenants or a total of 30 officers. The requirement for Colonels and Lt. Colonels is particularly pressing. I need officers with intelligence or counter-intelligence background who are intelligent, young, vigorous and energetic, who have had sufficient experience in intelligence work to develop the detective instinct to the extent that they are able to see the implications of their own and others actions. I need people who can analyze a situation and come up with recommendations.

I realize that the personnel situation is acute everywhere, but will appreciate your continued assistance in this problem.



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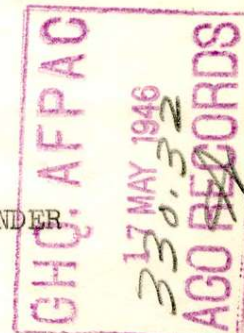

1. Reference: Paragraph 3 of C.L.O. Memorandum No. 1696 (PM) dated 12 April 1946, subject as above.

2. Of the documents and records, the return of which was requested by the above Memorandum, those which are listed in the attached sheets have not yet been received by the First Demobilization Ministry.

3. The military register is a complete record of servicemen's careers and is kept in the custody of the Assistance Division of each local Demobilization Office as the only data available for giving assistance to and exercising supervision over demobilized and undemobilized servicemen under its jurisdiction. It is indispensable for carrying on demobilization business which involves examination as to whether or not an officer, non-commissioned officer, or private on the reserved list comes under the category to be excluded from public office, investigation of soldiers' careers, which is frequently directed by the General Headquarters, or sending of notifications of death or granting of death gratuities to the bereaved families, etc.

4. With the above circumstances in view it is requested anew that the General Headquarters be good enough to see to it that the documents and records listed in the enclosure be returned as soon as practicable.

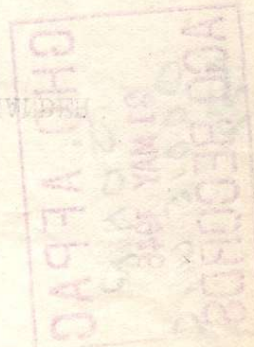

1. Attached hereto for your information are the following items:

a. Microfilm containing a reproduction of an official Home Ministry Register of approximately 4500 American-born Japanese who were granted Japanese citizenship, together with a translation of the same.

b. Alphabetical list of Nisei which contains information relative to the wartime employment of Americans of Japanese ancestry as known to this headquarters.

2. It will be noted that most of the jobs described were of a temporary emergency nature and that Japanese nationality was not a prerequisite. In several instances, especially among persons working at the Japanese Foreign Office, Nisei were advised by Japanese authorities not to acquire Japanese citizenship.

3. The majority of the Nisei contacted allege that they were forced to take the employment indicated under threat of considerable personal harm. They further state that whether they wanted to or not they had to remain in Japan and keep themselves alive, and that since they were not permitted to repatriate to the United States and were not interned by the Japanese, they of necessity secured such employment as was available to them.

4. The American Consulate at Yokohama is currently examining the cases of Nisei in Japan to determine the status of their American citizenship. Report of actions and opinions in each case is forwarded to the Department of State.

After the termination of the war these Formosans or their families seem to have informed the Chinese court of the above matter. Hence the apprehension and detention of the Japanese above mentioned.

3. The so-called Formosan independence movement was an act violating the Law for the Maintenance of Public Peace and Order (Chian-Iji-Ho) which was then in force, and the above-stated Yoshio Ikeuchi and other five took part in the adjudication of the sentence; in other words, they acted justly in accordance with the provisions of the law then effective. Nothing in the nature of torture was committed towards the offenders.

4. Under the above circumstances, it is requested that the General Headquarters be good enough to use its good offices to find out whether they have been released or not, and if still in detention, to have them released as soon as practicable.



2. Part of the Foreign Office telegrams were destroyed in a fire on 8 January 1942 and the greater part of them were burnt up in the air-raid fire on 25 - 26 May 1945. Bureaux and Sections of the Foreign Office used to keep in the steel-cabinets telegrams relating to matters in their charge, and so in the two fires, especially when the Foreign Office was burnt down on 26 May 1945, nearly all telegrams were reduced to ashes. Among the copies of telegrams kept by the Section of Archives there were some which remained unburnt, but in anticipation of the landing of the American forces, disposition of documents were commenced, and by the time the war came to an end the greater part of documents of the most confidential nature had been incinerated. Such being the case, it is impossible to furnish the requested copies.

3. During September 1941, Teijiro Toyoda, Foreign Minister, Riji Amo, Vice-Minister, Taro Terasaki, Director of the Bureau of American Affairs, Shiroji Yuki, Chief of 1st Section of Bureau of American Affairs, and from October to December 1941, Shigenori Togo, Foreign Minister, Haruhiko Nishi, Vice-Minister, Kumaichi Yamamoto, Director of the Bureau of American Affairs, Shunichi Kase, Chief of 1st Section of Bureau of American Affairs, all or some of them - are presumed, as a matter of course, to have signed every telegram relating to the United States of America. 


1. The Japanese Government wishes to bring to the knowledge of the General Headquarters of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers that no information has been available regarding the whereabouts and safety of

- (a) Ambassador Naotake Sato and other Japanese diplomatic and consular officials in Soviet Union;
- (b) Japanese diplomatic couriers in that country;
- (c) Japanese press correspondents in Moscow;
- (d) representative of the Japan-Russia Fisheries Co. in Vladivostok;
- (e) employees of the Japan-Russia Fisheries Co. and crew in Utka and Kikchik (Kamchatka).

2. After the termination of the war the Japanese Government, through the intermediary of Sweden, which represents the Japanese interests in Soviet Union, requested the Soviet Government several times for information concerning the whereabouts and safety of Japanese nationals in that country, but the latter Government, on the ground that it could not recognize Sweden as the protecting power of the Japanese interests in Soviet Union because of the complete change of Japan's international position due to her surrender, refused to give satisfactory reply to the Swedish Government concerning the whereabouts and safety of Japanese nationals in Soviet Union.

3. In these circumstances, the whereabouts and safety of the Japanese in Soviet Union is a matter of deep concern to the Japanese Government. Therefore, it would be deeply grateful if, through the assistance of the General Headquarters, information could be obtained with respect to the Japanese in question.

1. The Japanese Government wishes to bring to the knowledge of the General Headquarters of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers that no information has been available regarding the whereabouts and safety of

- (a) Ambassador Notsuke Sato and other Japanese diplomatic and consular officials in Soviet Union;
- (b) Japanese diplomatic couriers in that country;
- (c) Japanese press correspondents in Moscow;
- (d) representative of the Japan-Russia Fisheries Co. in Vladivostok;
- (e) employees of the Japan-Russia Fisheries Co. and crew in Uka and Kikchik (Kamohatka).

2. After the termination of the war the Japanese Government, through the intermediary of Sweden, which represents the Japanese interests in Soviet Union, requested the Soviet Government several times for information concerning the whereabouts and safety of Japanese nationals in that country, but the latter Government, on the ground that it could not recognize Sweden as the protecting power of the Japanese interests in Soviet Union because of the complete change of Japan's international position due to her surrender, refused to give satisfactory reply to the Swedish Government concerning the whereabouts and safety of Japanese nationals in Soviet Union.

3. In these circumstances, the whereabouts and safety of the Japanese in Soviet Union is a matter of deep concern to the Japanese Government. Therefore, it would be deeply regrettable if, through the assistance of the General Headquarters, information could be obtained with respect to the Japanese in that country.

Living Conditions at CHINNAMPO North Korea

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1. Attached is a letter from the Central Liaison Office, forwarded as an inclosure was the English translation of a report by Mr. Hisashi Koyama, Chief of the Aluminum Section of the Chinnampo Factory, Nissen Light Metal Co. Ltd. The report was printed in the Tokyo Shuinbun, 23 Nov 45.

2. The principal points made in the report are summarized:

a. All banks and other financial organizations were closed upon the entry of Soviet Troops into North Korea.

b. On 25 Aug a Soviet unit consisting of one captain, one member of the political department, and 24 soldiers entered Chinnampo.

c. Political activity was started the next morning. A Communist committee of leftists and factory workers was organized. This was followed by the red labor guild in various factories.

d. Even before the signing of the Instrument of Surrender, the Red Army started to disarm the Japanese forces and hand the arms over to the Koreans.

e. Communists are divided into two groups:

(1) Reconstruction group - inspired by Communist Party of Japan and international in principle.

(2) Chang-an group - formed at Chang-an temple and advocates anti-imperialism and syndicalism.

f. There are indications that Soviet Russia intends to transfer Japanese to Siberia and the Ural districts at present suffering from the shortage of labor, and to organize a Japanese community of its own, thereby preparing the way for the formation of a Japanese republic there.

In compliance with your letter in reference to the above-mentioned subject dated 11 November 1945, the following information is submitted to you:

1. With regard to the attacking the Panama Canal at the outset of the war, namely, on the 8 December, 1941, we had no notion whatever of making an investigation nor of planning thereof.
2. Around March 1945 the idea of attacking the Panama Canal with submarine based planes occurred to us, in fact, but to realize this would entail various difficulties, the idea failed to be materialized.
