- When I first arrived t Camp # 17 Omute, we were not A bothered much for the first week or so, I en nearly every day there would be three of four prisoners taken to the guardhouse and subjected to torture and heatings. The Japanese world ci im we had not "goose stenned" enough or had failed to salute a call "curi" (a verbal salute). In the grardhouse the prisoners would be forced to kneel on bamboo poles thout two inches thick and remain in that position for hours. I myself had to do that once for five hours, and the poles made dents along my sains and at my knees. It was several days before I could walk straight after that. One westralian had to have both legs amoutated above the ankle because his feet froze when he was forced to kneel in that menner during last winter. Also I was reaten with a club about six inches wide and an inch and a half thick and about s long as a baseball bat. This occurred while I was in the guardhouse about August or September 1944. I saw many others received the same treatment nearly every day. The commander of the care when I first not there was 1st Lt. Urri but I do not rerember his successor's name who took over about a year later. The came interpreter's name was Out. Another civilian called Yamar this the interpreter at the corl mine whore we wo kat. le world torment those prisoners, who were injured or sick and forced to go to the mine for light work, by forcing them to use their injured arm or strained back for work they could not do. He was an average Jap with no peculiar marks. Snoke English.

also when a prisoner as to be beaten the guards would force the rest of us to watch and wor i ridicule and laugh at a prisoner if he "hollered".

During the last three for four months I was told by some of the prisoners that the were ade to stand in a puddle of water and them shocked unconscious by a 110 volt electric wire. We heard those sen scream when this happened and talked to one Du chman and one American soldier who had this done to them.

Sometimes I saw men set heaten with steel rods about a quarter inch thick and three or four feet long. One American raced Gousith (phonotic) was besten in this manner.

His prison number was 500. This hampened two or three months before the Jans surrender d. A lot of wan caught pneumonia from a size of water through a the winter just as they started out or work.
