The Disposal of Chinese, Korean, and PW Laborers.

With the end of the war, great changes in the labor field are naturally anticipated. As a means of maintaining public order in the country, the authorities concerned are at present preparing directives which will expedite such matters.

A summary of such information as we have been able to learn from the PW Intelligence Bureau, the Munitions Ministry, etc. is as follows:

1. PsW.

- A. With the end of the war the handing over of these men will materialize according to the agreements, and until the designation of the place, time, and so forth, of the transfers, their management will be completely in the hands of the Army. It is desired that the PsW be assembled in one place, but owing to the scattered location of existing camps, the equipment on hand, transportation facilities, etc., this is completely impossible. Therefore, the facilities of the internment camps already established will be utilized. The head of every internment camp, according to the notification issued on the 17th, will secure a three or four month supply of food. The decision as to whether or not to make the prisoners work during the remainder of their internment period is left entirely to the discretion of the head of each internment camp.
- B. The movement of PsW will be entirely controlled by Army orders and commands. However, the person responsible must maintain close contact with the official in charge of field workers.
- C. Major YOKOYAMA (横山) of the Intelligence Bureau has offered the following advice:
 1. The treatment of PsW by our country up to now has been generally adequate. Although there is no fear of a problem arising on this point, because the war ended as it did, we should now give still more consideration to the treatment of the PsW in order to do things in a way which will leave no cause for regret in the future. It is important that no bad impressions are created at this time.

2. In any case, if PsW on any project have a tendency to bear ill will toward any of the workers, it would be advisable to apply methods of pacification, such as transferring the workers elsewhere.

Chinese and Korean Laborers

At the present time the authorities concerned are hurriedly taking action to dispose of conscript laborers, students, volunteer units, etc. It is obvious that the imported labor groups of Chinese and Koreans will be sent back to their respective countries. Under present transportation conditions, it is impossible to facilitate their shipment. For the time being, they will remain where they are and as soon as the authorities complete plans for their return respective camps will be notified. Until such time, their management will be unchanged.


PsW Internment Camps

Since the Allies will undoubtedly investigate all PsW internment camps, it is advisable that no immediate repairs are made to buildings and they should not be used for other purposes. They must be left as before and must be kept clean. The following must be notified of these orders:

All prefectural offices.

All former employers of PsW and the NAGASAKI and HAKOZAKI Police Stations.



1	Daily working hours: (Two or three hours are subtracted from the period between departure from, and return to, the internment camp).	From beginning to end three shifts were employed. The period between departure from, and return to, the internment camp was nine hours. Two or three hours may be subtracted from this period. Actual working hours amounted to approximately five and a half hours per day.

Request for Information on PsW Labor

In order to refute the protest which no doubt will be filed in the near future by Allied countries concerning PsW labor, containing charges to the effect that labor was too excessive, PsW were driven to work like machines, they were not even given time to rest, etc, I request that you make a clear report on the following subjects:

1. Actual circumstances concerning the management of labor. (Give careful description on a separate sheet.)
2. Conditions after the end of the war, such as the fact that PsW sent letters of gratitude to employers for their kindness and their exchange of courtesies with the Japanese.



The Actual Circumstances Concerning the Supervision of PsW Labor
